## Interview

What's your earliest memory of creating art?

Maybe when I was ten, not studying for exams and drawing instead!

If you could collaborate with any artist, living or dead, who would it be and why?

Hieronymus Bosch – for his uncanny ability to foresee human folly and offer razorsharp social observations that still resonate today.

What's the weirdest thing you've ever used as a medium/tool/platform in your artwork?

Cultivating microbes and orchestrating ant movement using bait to create controlled, collective formations.

How do you come up with the titles for your pieces?

My titles hint at the broader ideas underlying each work. They act as subtle entry points rather than literal explanations.

What's the most unusual source of inspiration you've ever had?

My fascination with natural systems led me to grow microbes in a lab and observe their behavior under a microscope. This curiosity pushed me into pseudo-scientific spaces, testing the boundaries of where an artist can belong.

If you could only use three colors for the rest of your life, which would you choose? Blue, Ochre, and Black

What piece of art do you take the most pride in and why?

I take pride in inventing my own coded system called Zuban-e-Kursi (the language of a chair). It uses deconstructed chair parts to mimic organized chaos, which I can now write proficiently. This language becomes a device for generating algorithmic environments in my paintings, referencing ecological systems whose logic may not be immediately knowable, yet always carries a symbiotic purpose.

Do you have any quirky rituals or habits



when you're in your creative zone?

Tea, I must have a cup of tea to begin working on anything!

If your art had a soundtrack, what would be the top three songs on it?



## DUBAI: GAME. SET. MATCH— THE ACTORS STOLE THE SHOW

A witty, fast-paced play where friendships, secrets, and smartphones collide

Having recently watched the Bollywood version (Khel Khel Mein, 2024) on an OTT platform—and, many moons ago, the original Italian version (Perfect Strangers, 2016)—one approaches yet another adaptation with a degree of curiosity, especially when it comes to live performance. The Italian film has inspired countless adaptations across stage and

screen worldwide, and now finds its way to Dubai in a Tall Tales Production in association with Cross Brox Studio, adapted by Sid Abbas. The staging of the Game. Set. Match (GSM) adds to the growing repertoire of works brought to local audiences, and it was heartening to see the Playhouse Studio Theatre, Mall of the Emirates, host a full house for the



September 12, 2025, evening show. The play ran on the weekend, with a matinee show included.

The multi-national cast—a hallmark of Tall Tales—was a delight. Familiar names such as director Satya Baskaran, Priyanka Johri, Gabriela Ioana, Meghana Dhawan, and Ryan Durand shared the stage with newer faces (at least for me), including Ziyad Bangara, Jenni Schmidt, Reem Tarifi, and Mahmoud Basyoni. Asad Raza Khan, a long—standing figure in Dubai's theatre scene, remains steadfast in his commitment to the stage.

The venue itself, in its third avatar (once DUCTAC, later Art For All, now The New Covent Garden), is always a pleasure to return to. Much remains unchanged, except perhaps the missing Costa that once defined the foyer—but the short, scenic walk from the Mall of the Emirates parking to the separate entrance still carries its magic.

A few elements of the staging may not have fully landed—the constant switching of lights to indicate settings in the opening minutes, for instance, distracted more than they clarified. The set, generously supported by a home furnishings brand, looked inviting but didn't fully convey the "luxury tennis club suite" that the script calls for. That said, one must also acknowledge the financial realities of local productions: these are labors of love, often mounted by passionate creators outside of their day jobs, and the effort to bring such stories alive is commendable.

As always, audience etiquette makes a difference. A gentle reminder to silence phones and refrain from conversations mid-show would have elevated the experience for everyone. Ironically, the chatter about which Bollywood actor played which role in the film adaptation only underlined the play's own message about the omnipresence of our phones and the double-edged sword of constant connectivity.

Yes, the plot is familiar—and for many, the twists were already known—but this placed a special responsibility on the actors, who rose to the challenge brilliantly. Each character was owned with energy and precision:

- Amir (Asad Raza Khan) was at his natural best.
- Aairah (Priyanka Johri) complemented him perfectly.
- Yara (Reem Tarifi) owned the role with confidence.
- Jad (Mahmoud Basyoni) nailed the comic timing and facial expressions.
- Stuart (Ryan Durand) brought the right dose of goofiness.
- Lizzie (Jenni Schmidt) was fun and engaging.
- Max (Ziyad Bangara) played suave effortlessly.
- Gretchen (Gabriela Ioana) delivered with frolic.

The subtle Arabic touches and Dubai-flavored humor were welcome additions—throw in a "yalla" or a "habibi" and the audience lights up, a reminder that adaptations can still feel bespoke to the city we



live in.

The only lingering thought is this: while Dubai's theatre community is brimming with talent, one can only long for the day when more original scripts grace the stage. Ticket sales often lean toward familiar names—be it Shakespeare, Bollywood inspirations, or global adaptations. Yet, productions like GSM keep the momentum alive and remind us of the appetite for live theatre here. Having watched multiple productions across the UAE, one can't help but wish for that extra wow factor to match the talent on stage. Perhaps it's a question of resources, exposure, or broader support, but at times, many productions feel reminiscent of their earlier runs. The consistency is admirable, yet as audiences, we find ourselves hoping the directors will push further, take bolder risks, and surprise us with something truly unforgettable.

At its heart, Game. Set. Match was a playful yet piercing mirror to our times—where public lives collide with private ones, and secrets, confessions, and hilariously disastrous messages tumble out when our phones are laid bare. The production may not have had a "wow" factor in terms of scale, but it did in terms of performance. The actors were unquestionably the highlight, and in the end, it is their craft that ensured the audience left both entertained and reflective.

### More on the script:

What happens when public lives collide with

private ones—and secret lives slip into the mix—over a game that's anything but innocent? Game. Set. Match unfolds in the plush setting of a luxury tennis club suite, where seven longtime friends reunite for a destination wedding. A seemingly playful challenge—placing their phones on the table for all to see—quickly turns into digital Russian roulette. Messages, calls, and secrets spill out, igniting a cocktail of confessions, affairs, and hilariously disastrous texting. The result is a sharp, funny, and unexpectedly poignant reminder of how pings, dings, and unread notifications rule our lives. Whether you've been in a relationship, wrestled with a group chat, or sent a message you instantly regretted, this play will feel uncomfortably—and entertainingly—close to home.




## Because we care

A team of 17-year-old UAE students. Yuvaan Sawlani, Ayaan Mohammed, Moulik Savla, and Atharva Mehra, have unveiled their innovative seating solution, CareChair, designed to transform classroom experiences for neurodiverse students. The noble idea was inspired by the talented students' shared observational research on students with ADHD and other sensory challenges, who often struggle to stay focused and engaged in a classroom setting. According to a 2023 study published by Eastern Mediterranean Health Journal, about 4 percent of school-aged children in the UAE are diagnosed with ADHD. By cleverly combining empathydriven design features with functionality, the students created a chair that addresses challenges faced by overwhelmed students, reducing restlessness and fostering inclusivity and confidence in learners.

The CareChair features an extended seat base that enables flexible seating positions, built-in fidget toys to reduce stress, and interchangeable sensory tools that can be customised to suit different student needs. Importantly, all sensory elements are crafted from recycled materials, including the fidget spinner and recycled Rubik's cube, reinforcing the team's commitment to sustainability alongside inclusivity. Designed in the shape of a friendly bear, CareChair provides a comforting and nurturing presence for students, featuring tactile elements such as grippy rubber pads and calming stimulation that support students' engagement in class lessons.

"Our mission is to make classrooms more inclusive by removing barriers to engagement for neurodiverse children. The CareChair empowers students to regulate their energy and emotions, allowing for minimal disruption to in-class learning. It creates a space where students can feel calm, safe, and confident to learn," says Sawlani

Initial beta testing with students has shown promising results. One user highlighted how the spacious design allowed for greater comfort and movement, while the discreet fidget features helped them stay focused without drawing attention. Teachers also reported a calmer classroom environment, with improved



participation and reduced restlessness.

The students plan to first integrate the CareChair as part of a phased rollout in Arcadia schools in the UAE, including Arcadia British School in Jumeirah Village Triangle and Arcadia Global School in Al Furjan. The CareChair will be placed across the school's counselor offices and select classrooms before expanding to other schools across the UAE. The inspiring team of young inventors' long—term vision is to position the chair as a benchmark standard for all learning environments.

The journey to creating the CareChair was not without challenges. Balancing functionality with comfort required creating multiple prototypes and market research sessions with students and teachers.

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"We wanted to make sure the chair was not bulky or intimidating, but flexible to the needs of its user, and through the process of trial and error, we were able to refine the design to strike the right balance," adds Mohammed.

For the team, the most rewarding moment has been seeing the chair in use. "Watching students interact with the CareChair and hearing that it genuinely improved their focus and confidence showed us that this is more than just a school project – it is a product that can change lives. This journey has taught us that true innovation in education comes from designing with empathy. Even small changes in the classroom can transform how students with special needs engage and learn," concludes Savla.



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# THE ABU DHABI ART FAIR IS BACK IN NOVEMBER

The 2025 edition highlights dynamic art scenes from Nigeria, the Gulf region, and Türkiye, whilst welcoming first—time participants from Algeria, Senegal, the Netherlands, Peru and Tanzania, underscoring the fair's growing global influence.

Under the esteemed patronage of His Highness Sheikh Khaled bin Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi and Chairman of the Abu Dhabi Executive Council, and organized by the Department of Culture and Tourism - Abu Dhabi (DCT Abu Dhabi), the Abu Dhabi Art Fair returns this year from 19 to 23 November for its 17th edition with over 140 galleries from 52 cities across 37 countries participating. The 2025 edition highlights dynamic art scenes from Nigeria, the Gulf region, and Türkiye, whilst welcoming first-time participants from Algeria, Senegal, the Netherlands, Peru, and Tanzania, underscoring the fair's growing global influence.

Since its launch in 2009, the fair has become the largest in the region, attracting leading international galleries, including Pace,


Richard Saltoun Gallery, Mennour, Hanart TZ Gallery, and ATHR. This year, they are joined by debut exhibitors such as Loft Art Gallery, RGR, Pedro Cera, and EQTNA Rare Books. The number of exhibitors has surged 40% compared to last year, reflecting Abu Dhabi's rising stature in both institutional and private collecting circles.

H.E. Mohamed Khalifa Al Mubarak, Chairman of the Department of Culture and Tourism – Abu Dhabi, stated: "The upcoming edition of Abu Dhabi Art Fair promises to be the most ambitious yet, featuring a record number of galleries from around the world. Over the years, the fair has evolved into the region's most influential platform for art and ideas, a cultural moment where the UAE's pioneering spirit engages with the global art community. Each edition advances our mission

Our curatorial focus continues to centre under-represented art histories and foster equity in global art narratives through the platform of the fair. From pioneers of the Peruvian Amazon, Venezuela and Brazil to modernists from Türkiye, artists from Nigeria's Osogbo art movement, Khaleeji trailblazers, modern artists from North Afric, and leading artists from China, this year's fair resonates with the globally impactful, museum-led vision shaping Saadiyat Island's cultural identity."

### Global Focus Sectors

This year's fair features curated Focus sectors that amplify diverse art narratives:

Nigeria Spotlight: In collaboration with the Ministry of Art, Culture, Tourism and the Creative Economy, this section

spotlights seven pioneering galleries from Nigeria, showcasing the strength and dynamism of the country's contemporary art scene. As one of Africa's leading cultural hubs, Nigeria continues to shape global conversations through bold, narrative—driven works that explore identity, politics, history, and place. The Focus sector at Abu Dhabi Art forms part of the country's Nigeria Everywhere initiative, which aims to increase global exposure of Nigerian creativity, particularly in new and emerging regions, by spotlighting the diversity and excellence of its cultural output.

Participating galleries will showcase a diverse range of emerging and established artists whose practices are grounded in local realities while engaging with global discourse. From mixed-media explorations to figurative painting and conceptual installations, the works reflect the innovation, depth, and urgency that define contemporary Nigerian art today. Participating galleries include SOTO Gallery, AMG Projects, returning exhibitor kó, O'DA Gallery, 1897 Gallery, Windsor Gallery, Ishara Gallery, and a special project with MADhouse by Tikera Africa.
